

<p><b>Touches of embroidered crafts have been perceived in surviving works from the Iron Age (1300 BC-600 BC).</b></p> <p>In the Middle East embroidery began to represent social status. It was adorned by rich Muslims.</p> <p>The biggest piece of embroidery work is now at the Bretagne Museum in northern France- Called Bayeux tapestry, it is 70 metres long and 50 centimetres tall that depicts the events leading up to the Norman Conquest of England in 1066</p>

Subject Specific Vocabulary	
Key word	Definition
Embroidery	Embroidery is the craft of decorating fabric or other materials using a needle to apply thread or yarn. Embroidery may also incorporate other materials such as pearls, beads, quills, and sequins.
Stitch	a loop of thread or yarn resulting from a single pass or movement of the needle in sewing, knitting, or crocheting.
Backstitch	a method of sewing with <u>overlapping stitches</u> .
Running Stitch	a simple <u>needlework</u> stitch consisting of a line of small even <u>stitches</u> which run back and forth through the cloth without <u>overlapping</u> .
Blanket Stitch	a <u>buttonhole</u> stitch used on the edges of a blanket or other material too thick to be <u>hemmed</u> .
